

HISTORY

On 22 February 2011, a 6.3 magnitude earthquake struck the Christchurch region in New Zealand, killing 185 people, destroying 3500 homes and injuring more than 6600 people.

The earthquake's epicentre was near Lyttelton, just 10 kilometres southeast of Christchurch's central business district.

Australia deployed 3 Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) teams consisting of over 220 specialists from state and federal agencies following the disaster to support a global humanitarian response.



HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE

The Urban Search and Rescue team consists of a group of specialists appointed by state and federal agencies and certified by the International Search and Rescue Advisory Group (INSARAG), a global network under the United Nations.

The USAR team is trained to provide a humanitarian response to communities impacted by natural disasters worldwide.

It provides specialist capability to locate, provide medical assistance and remove casualties who have been trapped or affected by a structural collapse following a disaster.

The USAR team will continue to support worldwide humanitarian efforts into the future.
